This is the building in Washington where Congress meets to discuss and make new laws. It is called
This building is actually located just outside of Washington in Virginia. It is the headquarters of the United States Department of Defense where military decisions are made. It is the largest office building in the world. It is called the
This building is the monument to the nation's first president. It is 555 feet tall and NO building in Washington is permitted to be built that is taller. It is called the
This building serves as the residence and offices of the President of the United States of America. It has been the home of every president since 1900. It is located at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue. It is called the
This building serves as the home of the highest federal court in the land. Here, nine justices, appointed for life by the President, discuss and rule on important court cases. It is called the
This building honors our 16 th president. It is located on the west end of the National Mall across from the Washington Monument. It was here, where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered his famous "I have a Dream" Speech. It is called the
This building honors our third president and author of the Declaration of Independence. Excerpts from the Declaration of Independence are etched into the walls of the structure. It is called the
The "castle" pictured to the left is an administrative building for the system of free museums located in downtown Washington. One of the museums, the National Air and Space Museum, holds the world's largest collection of air and spacecrafts. These museums are collectively part of the Institute.
